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About Star Island...

Geography, Geology, and Nature

Life on Star Island, second largest of the group of nine rocky islands lying nearly ten miles southeast of the mouth of the Piscataqua River, is much like living on a boat. On every side one sees and hears the sea. The shores of New England are visible to the west and north, but to the east and south are only sky and sea. The boundary line between Maine and New Hampshire passes through the islands and ledges so that five of the islands, Appledore, Cedar, Duck, Malaga, and Smuttynose, lie within the State of Maine while four of the islands, Lunging, Seavey, Star, and White, lie within New Hampshire. Star Island is in the Town of Rye Historic District and on the National and State of New Hampshire Historic Registers.

Fisherman are believed to have stopped here from before the time John Smith arrived in 1614 and mapped the seacoast, naming these island, now known as the Isles of Shoals, "Smyth's Isles" and opening up New England to settlement. Probably named for the

Sailors gave the name Star Island, first referenced in 1651, because the Island's "points stretch out in all directions like flashes of a distant star".

"shoaling" or schooling of fish, the Isles of Shoals became the busiest commercial port on this side of the ocean and dominated the fish market, indeed setting the price, for a century and a half.

The islands are primarily composed of igneous rocks, especially granite and pegmatite. Traces remain of older metamorphic rocks, which were uplifted by the intruding granite and were largely eroded away. The Isles of Shoals reveal numerous traces of the great ice age, which ended some 10,000 years ago and marked the islands with erratic boulders and a rounding off of the rock masses and souring of the soil.

Life – aquatic and terrestrial – is abundant. While essentially all the soil for the islands is post glacial, and the thin earth and cold winter winds have kept trees and woody plants to a small number, more than 250 land plant species have been identified on the islands. A checklist of the marine flora and fauna of the Isles of Shoals, compiled by the staff of the Cornell University Shoals Marine Lab on Appledore, included 256 species of invertebrates, 139 species of algae, 49 species of fish and 145 species of birds.

The natural world is unavoidable on Star Island. Early risers enjoy the sunrise from East Rock, and everyone enjoys the beautiful view from the lobby porch as the sun sets behind the summer house, site of the old Fort Star. Astronomer and poet alike find inspiration in the unbroken skies. During the light of day, interesting geological formations (trap dikes, a glacial pothole, and "erratics") become apparent. Well over 100 native plants have been identified. Numerous species of birds have been sighted, including bald eagles on Appledore and Smuttynose Islands, snowy owls, and nesting colonies of cormorants, snowy egrets, and black guillemots (the southernmost on record). Whales and dolphins can be seen in the Shoals area, and harbor seals have been sighted swimming in Gosport Harbor and sunbathing on Star's rocky shoreline.

Summer Conferences and Events

The Star Island Corporation has owned and operated Star Island since 1916. As a not-for-profit organization, our room and board fees are structured to provide affordable individual and family retreat. While Star Island is founded on the liberal spiritual ideals of Unitarian-Universalism and the United Church of Christ, people representing a variety of beliefs attend conferences regularly. Each of the Star Island conferences or events is self-administered, arranging for speakers, workshops, and childcare as well as registering participants. Art, music, natural history, world affairs, science, and spirituality are common threads. Most of the weeklong conferences have some scholarship assistance for those with clear need. The amounts vary, as do the application processes. Please refer to the individual conference descriptions (pages 16-20 and 25-43) for information about availability.



Buildings and Amenities

Over one hundred-years-old, the Oceanic House is the largest structure on Star Island and its main lobby, writing room, Pink Parlor, and dining hall provide a glimpse into the life of the Grand Hotel Era when Star Island attracted such notable artists and writers as Childe Hassam and Nathaniel Hawthorne. Star Island prides itself on its unique, family style food service in the Oceanic Hotel's historic dining room. Ample, fresh, and healthy food is provided at each meal, and second and third helpings are available. Low-sodium, supplemental-protein, and vegetarian meals are available for those who request them in advance (see the 2005 Registration Form at the center of this brochure). Individual dietary requests such as salt-free, dairy-free, or wheat-free diets cannot be accommodated.

Modern amenities inside the Oceanic House include a snack bar providing bagels, fruit, lobster and crab rolls, ice cream, pretzels, soda, hot dogs, candy, and other snacks for sale every day. The lobby store stocks items such as toiletries, film, and batteries and a messenger service to Portsmouth is available for a modest fee. The bookstore offers a variety of reading material including popular fiction and nonfiction, those written or recommended by conference speakers, and histories of Star Island and the Isles of Shoals. Postcards, note cards, and prints are also available. A gift shop sponsored by the Isles of Shoals Association (Unitarian-Universalist), Inc. offers clothing, jewelry, cards, toys, and novelties. Income from the store enables the ISA (U-U), Inc. to provide valuable support to the island.

In addition to the hotel's guest rooms, a number of small cottages and stone buildings provide accommodations and conference meeting rooms. Life is comfortable but not modern. While living quarters are equipped with shared toilet facilities for each floor, there are no baths. Showers are normally available twice a week.

Special accommodations consist of limited facilities for mobility-impaired individuals. Cottage A has a wheelchair accessible room, with private toilet and basin. This room can accommodate two adult individuals. The main lobby, dining room, and pathways to several cottages and decks are wheelchair accessible. Adjacent to the lobby, there is a specially equipped restroom, including a shower stall. The rugged yet comfortable "Vic's Vehicle" is available to transport guests unable to make it on foot from the dock to the hotel and back, as needed. Although we have these limited facilities, most sleeping quarters and a few conference meeting rooms are reached by walking up at least one flight of stairs or over a rocky

path. If you have accessibility concerns, we suggest that you check with the conference chairperson or registrar to see if our facilities will accommodate your personal needs.

One of Star Island's most prominent features is the chapel, a simple stone meetinghouse built in 1800 on the highest point of land. Candlelight chapel services are a cherished Star Island tradition. At the close of each day, Shoalers gather at the foot of the hill and form a procession, carrying candle lanterns as the villagers of long ago carried their whale-oil lamps up the same winding path to the meeting house. Inside the chapel, the candle lanterns are hung on brackets from the walls, providing the only source of light.



Vaughn-Thaxter Memorial Cottage houses a library and reading room, as well as the Thaxter Collection of art and artifacts from the days of island poet and artist Celia Thaxter and her family, and early rec??ords of Gosport Village history. A curator is on duty during regularly scheduled hours to answer questions and share island lore and legend.

The Rutledge Marine Laboratory overlooks Gosport Harbor, and serves as the focal point for those who wish to see the island habitat through the eyes of science. Inside, salt water tanks and sea tables provide near-natural habitats for a variety of aquatic creatures collected from the harbor and surrounding waters by the island's naturalists. Terrariums allow visitors to observe and identify island flora and fauna. The marine lab staff is available during regularly scheduled hours to share information and answer questions. They also conduct narrated walks focusing on birds, flowers, geology, and inter-tidal biology.

Island E-mail and Phone System

We strongly encourage that incoming messages directed to conferees should be sent by e-mail to <u>message@starisland.org</u> whenever possible instead of tying up the island's phone system. Though we are unable to respond directly to your e-mails, our staff will print out your message and post it on the conferee message board. When sending an e-mail to this address, please enter "CONFEREE: [first and last name]" in the subject line. Sorry, sending e-mails and faxes from the island is not an option except when extenuating circumstances arise.

Phone access is limited on Star, and phone calls are restricted to six minutes. There is a service charge for outgoing calls to offset call costs and equipment expenses. The primary island phone line is (603) 601-0832, and all calls directed to guests on Star should be made to this number. If the main line is unavailable for use, emergencies or urgent incoming messages can be directed to the back-up island phone line of (603) 964-7252.

Important Island Regulations and Policies

We try very hard to be as unrestrictive as possible and allow individuals and groups to pursue their enjoyment of Star Island unhampered by "shoulds" and "shouldn'ts". However, we must – for the safety and comfort of all – strictly enforce the following island regulations:

- *Smoking/Open Flame:* Smoking and open flame is prohibited inside all Star Island buildings (with the exception of a few designated areas). Further restrictions may apply (resulting from, for example, extremely dry weather conditions) and will be announced during the mandatory orientation session at the beginning of your stay on Star. Anyone who does not respect this policy will be required to leave on the next boat and will be charged for the full conference period. Tobacco products and alcohol are not available for sale on the island, nor may they be ordered through the messenger service.
- *Electrical:* Due to the limitations of the island's electrical system (we generate our own electricity on Star Island) and for safety reasons, conferees are asked not to bring appliances with heating elements, e.g. heating pads, hair dryers, and hot water immersion heaters. Conferees with medical equipment electrical needs (i.e. three pronged receptacle), please specify these needs on your registration form.
- *Firearms/Fireworks:* No firearms or fireworks are permitted on Star Island. Violators will be required to leave on the next boat and will be charged for the full conference period.
- **Drugs/Alcohol:** Compliance is expected of all federal and New Hampshire State laws governing the possession and use of illegal drugs and the use of alcoholic beverages by persons under 21 years of age. Consumption of alcoholic beverages is not permitted in public areas (except if specifically included as part of a conference function).
- *Syringe Disposal:* All used syringes or "sharps" must be taken to the first aid station for disposal. Do not dispose of sharps in guest rooms or in public trash containers. If someone is "stuck" as a result of careless disposal, the individual

responsible will be required to undergo a series of blood tests locally at his or her own expense.

- *Pets:* Conferees and guests are not permitted to have pets on Star Island. Dogs for the legally blind and hearing-impaired individuals are permitted with advanced notice.
- *Breakwater:* The breakwater is off limits at all times. Stay back from the water's edge elsewhere on the island as well, since the surf and tides are unpredictable.
- *Flora/Fauna:* Do not pick flowers or collect specimens of any kind. Island ecology is delicate—please do not collect any animal, plant, or soil samples.
- *Minor Children:* Parents retain full responsibility for their minor children (under age 18) at all times.
- *Outstanding Charges:* All outstanding charges must be paid in full or permission to return to the island in a subsequent season may be denied.

Star Island is private property and all conferees, guests and day visitors come to the island under license from the Star Island Corporation. This license may be revoked at any time if, in the sole discretion of those in charge of island operations, such action is deemed necessary because of behavior that causes disruption of a meeting, program, or activity; creates a threat to the health and safety of others; or causes damage to island property.

Island Ecology

Star Island is a fragile ecosystem, and we take our obligation as stewards of the island seriously. We work hard to create a balance through which thousands of Shoalers each summer can enjoy the island while protecting its wild and natural environment. As an island environment ten miles out to sea, Star Island must provide its own utilities including electricity, water, waste treatment, and garbage disposal. We handle the largest amount of compost in the State of New Hampshire. We grow our own flowers in a perennial garden and display them throughout the hotel and dining hall. We treat all of our wastewater at our permitted wastewater treatment facility, to comply with all pertinent state and federal guidelines and regulations. Maintaining and preserving our historic buildings is at the forefront of our operation.

Leisure Activities

A lifeguard is on duty at the dock for those who enjoy swimming, boating, and snorkeling. Other outdoor conference-sponsored recreation includes hikes on the rocks, fishing, tennis, basketball, volleyball, softball, and whiffleball (for small children). We have some athletic equipment, but you may want to bring your own tennis racquet and softball glove. For safety reasons, all softball participants are required to use the bats and "low flight" softballs provided by the island. Star Island's music director is available for conference chapel services, choral groups, and other musical activities. In addition, the director conducts a chorus of staff members who perform in the "Pelican Show" each week for the conference.

The People Who Work for Star Island

Every job on the island including docking boats and handling freight; cooking and serving food; maintaining the grounds, buildings, power plant, and wastewater treatment facility; and providing all hospitality services is staffed by a "Pelican", the affectionate term for the nearly 100 young people who work here and often return year after year to what *Yankee Magazine* called "one of the top ten summer jobs in New England". Star Island Corporation is a membership organization comprised of about 400 members and governed by a board of directors under the direction of Irene Bush, President. Paul Jennings is Executive Director of Star Island. There are nine full-time staff members who work in the Portsmouth office and on Star Island and four seasonal staff members who work on island.

One of the most valuable crew of people who work for Star Island is our volunteers whose jobs during volunteer weekends include carpentry, housekeeping, painting, gardening, chair-caning, and all kinds of maintenance and repair work. Year-round volunteers provide valuable expertise from an array of professions.

Mandatory Orientation Session

All conferees are required to attend a welcoming orientation session shortly after arrival in order to receive current/updated information from the staff on safety and island living, as well as information on their conference. As safety regulations change from year to year, and for insurance purposes, even conferees who have attended orientation sessions in previous years are <u>required</u> to attend.

Boat and Parking Information

For the 2005 season, conferees will be traveling to and from Star aboard the 149 passenger "Captain's Lady." The "Captain's Lady" has been used primarily for offshore whale watches. She is well suited for the weather and sea conditions around the Shoals and should be able to make the trip in less than an hour. Use of a vessel this size will mean reverting to the tradition of many years ago when two round trips were necessary to bring the conferences to the island. For many long-time Shoalers, this will be a taste of nostalgia but for others, this will become a "new" tradition. Captain's Fishing Charters, owner of the "Captain's Lady," is based in Newburyport, Massachusetts, but will operate from the dock adjacent to where the Thomas Laighton is berthed. Conferees will park in the same lot we have used for the last several years. There are a few logistical issues yet to be worked out and we will send detailed information to conference leaders well in time for planning your summer trip to the island.

The change in transportation to and from Star Island came about this fall when the Isles of Shoals Steamship Company (ISSCo.) notified us they would be unable to continue their contract with us, in part because of the complications presented by Homeland Security. Since then, we have been in contact with a number of boat companies along the New Hampshire coast and as far south as Boston. After meeting with five boat owners, we selected Captain's Fishing Charters to provide conference transportation services for next year. We are confident that the change will have very little impact on most conferences and will do our best to make the transition to a new ferry service as easy as possible for everyone. A long term agreement with Captain's Fishing Charters is being discussed this winter and by the summer, we will be able to apprise you of the nature of ferry services for the next several years.

If you have a private boat, you are welcome to visit the island for a meal, or just to walk around. Please note that the island's dock is very busy, and only dinghies are permitted to tie up. Meals are served family style at 12:30 and 6:30, and include beverages and dessert. There is no lunch on Saturdays. You may call ahead for reservations or inquire at the front desk upon arrival.

Directions to Portsmouth, New Hampshire

From Interstate Route 95 (North or South), take Portsmouth Exit 7. Follow signs to downtown Portsmouth. The dock is about a half mile from the exit, on the left and across the street from the Sheraton. The entrance gate is no longer the ISSCo. main gate but rather one gate closer to Route 95 (last year's exit gate)—complete driving directions, parking, and boat schedules will be sent to conference leaders well in time for planning your summer trip to the island.

Both services require advanced reservations and drop off at the Sheraton Hotel, across the street from the dock.

C & J Trailways Bus Service: 800-258-7111, <u>www.cjtrailways.com</u>, 185 Grafton Road in Portsmouth, is a short cab ride from the dock. Greyhound Bus Lines: 800-231-2222, <u>www.greyhound.com</u>, the terminal in downtown Portsmouth is only a few blocks from the dock.

Medical Information

The Star Island Corporation assumes no liability for accidents, illnesses, or their treatment. Our first aid station is equipped only for basic treatment in an emergency. In an emergency, the United States Coast Guard provides transportation to the mainland, but the duration from the moment the emergency is reported to the moment the patient is on an ambulance is at least an hour, and may take much longer in poor weather or rough seas.

Individuals with medical conditions should consult their physicians before planning a week on this remote, rocky island. If you have medical equipment electrical needs (i.e. three pronged receptacle), please specify these needs on your registration form. If you have accessibility concerns, please check with the conference chairperson or registrar to see if our facilities will accommodate your personal needs. For information on prescription medication availability, please see the 2005 Registration Form in the center of this brochure.

If, between submission of your application and arrival on Star Island, your medical status changes so as to require outpatient treatment or physical therapy due to surgery, injury, or illness, the island registrar must be notified immediately. Failure to provide such notification before arrival could result in your being asked to leave Star Island if the island's medical staff, after making its own evaluation, deems such action necessary and in your best interest.

Pregnant women should note that Star Island has no facilities for delivery and is ten long miles by boat from the nearest hospital. If you will be in your last trimester during your conference, seek your doctor's advice. If you will be in the final three weeks of your pregnancy, please delay your visit to Star until next year, when you both can come.

If you have attended a conference at Star Island or made a contribution within the past two years, your name remains on the mailing list. Others may contact the Star Island Corporation. This brochure is mailed out the first week in February.

Registration Information...

How to Register & Registration Deadlines

Remove and carefully complete *both sides* of the 2005 Registration Form found in the center of this brochure. Mail your completed 2005 Registration Form, *one check* (for both the SIC room and board deposit(s) and the conference registration fee(s), and a self-addressed stamped envelope (postage amount listed in conference pages) to the address designated in the conference section of this brochure (pages 16-20 and 25-43).

Each conference sets its own registration policy and acceptance criteria, though it is generally true that registration acceptance process begins March 10. Registrations postmarked before then will be treated as if postmarked on March 10. Registrations postmarked after March 10 will be accepted, space available, according to postmark date. Check the island's website at <u>www.starisland.org</u> to see if space is available. We recommend that you have your envelope hand-canceled at the post office to ensure that the postmark is legible.

Housing Preferences

While every attempt will be made to accommodate room type preferences, no room request can be guaranteed. When requesting a room type, please keep the following in mind:

• Conferees are billed according to the accommodations assigned and occupied, regardless of housing requested.

Exceptions: Persons who requested not to be housed in motel units but had to be assigned to them anyway; persons who requested double occupancy but were assigned single occupancy; and minors assigned to motel units at the conference center's discretion.

- If you do not wish to be housed in a motel unit (due to expense), remember to select #5, "Double room (not motel unit)," under housing choices. Persons selecting #2, "Double room," may be assigned to ordinary double rooms or motel units at the convenience of the conference center, and will be billed as assigned.
- Families with children under eight years of age will be housed together, most likely on the second floor of the main building, to facilitate our childcare service.
- If you need accommodations on the first floor or near a rest room, you should indicate this in the Housing Needs column.
- It is important for parents to designate which children/adolescents may or may not share the same room with each other or with their parents. Also, they should state when adjacent or connecting rooms are desired. Attach an extra sheet to your registration form, if necessary.



Conference Registration Fee

The conference registration fee covers the cost of conference programs (such as conference staff and food for social events); each conference determines the amount and approves expenditures. Unless otherwise noted, conference program and registration fees are in addition to room and board charges. Fees and payment information are listed under each conference's description in the conference pages of this brochure (pages 16-20 and 25-43).

Child Care

During the regular season, the island staff provides babysitters who are on duty every evening from 8 to 11. To facilitate the sitter service, families with children under eight will be housed together, most likely in the main building. All families with one or more children under the age of eight are charged; the cost for the childcare service—\$38/family (\$13 for Laity Weekend)—is added to the room and board bills.

During scheduled adult activities, most conferences plan a full children's program, including childcare for those under three. Details of each conference's children's program may be found in the conference section of this booklet (pages 16-20 and 25-43) or by calling the conference registrar.

Minor Medical Release Form

Any person under eighteen years of age attending a conference without a parent or legal guardian is *required* to have a Minor Medical Release Form *completed*, *signed by a parent or legal guardian*, and *returned to the conference registrar before the application can be accepted*. This form is available from your conference registrar and on the official Star Island web site at <u>www.starisland.org</u>.

Room Classifications

- Single rooms are limited in number.
- Double, full-sized beds are limited in number. Double rooms have twin beds.
- Motel units are limited to double occupancy by adults only. They have private toilets and wash basins and two twin beds.
- Rooms accommodating four persons are charged at the triple room rate.

Room and Board Deposit Policy

The Star Island Corporation requires a deposit towards room and board for each person age two and over. The amount of this deposit is \$100 for conferences five days or more in length and \$50 for conferences four days or less in length. The deposit is due at the time of registration and is refundable up to six weeks prior to the conference start date, at which time it becomes non-refundable. Deposit refunds requested within six weeks of the conference start date resulting from exceptional circumstances are made at the sole discretion of the Star Island Corporation; inquiries should be made directly to the Island Registrar, contact information above or by e-mail to landerle@starisland.org (note that all other registration inquiries should be directed to the conference registrar). Most conference's registration fees are refundable up to the same date as the room and board deposit, but there are some exceptions, which are specified in the conference pages of this brochure (pages 16-20 and 25-43).

Notes Pertaining to Room and Board Rates

- ** We are in the process of implementing a credit card payment system for the 2005 season; credit card rates will not reflect the cash/check discount included in the above rate chart.
- The balance of room and board bills and parking fees are to be paid in full on island during your conference week. Personal and travelers checks are welcome. We cannot accept foreign currency, though Canadian checks payable in U.S. funds are accepted. There is a \$25 service charge for returned checks.
- The above rates do not include conference program and registration fees, which are specified in the conference pages of this brochure (pages 16-20 and 25-43). Staff members are paid as salaried employees and gratuity is no longer requested.
- Rates listed are per person and apply to ages as of conference date.
- Occupancy refers to the number of adults occupying a room; children's rates are determined by age. When children and adults are housed in the same room, adults are charged for double occupancy and children are charged by age.
- Children living in motel units at parent's request will be charged adult rates.
- Please review all charges on your bill before payment. We strongly encourage that any issues be resolved before you leave.
- Persons attending for less than the full conference period will be charged at the daily guest rate, not to exceed the full conference rate.

Natural History Conference

Saturday, June 25 to Saturday, July 2

The Natural History Conference (NHC) is for adults who have an interest in expanding their knowledge and appreciation of our world and their place in it.

Theme: Backyard Astronomy—How to Enjoy the Night Sky

Laquetta Karch, an Amateur Astronomer, will be joining us to explain how to enjoy the night sky from your backyard without spending hours in a classroom or having anything more than binoculars. Topics will include introduction to the night sky and star hopping, observing with binoculars, solar observing, lunar observing, deep sky objects (galaxies, nebulas, and clusters), as well as equipment selection. While logistics will probably preclude getting her 18 inch scope on the island, many telescopes will be on hand and conferees are not required to bring equipment. Two sessions per day are planned, the normal formal morning lecture with a practical session after evening chapel (weather permitting). Laquetta's husband, Ed, will be giving side talks on his work in Africa on the setup of National Parks, sustainable development, and his work with Wangari Maathai, 2004 Nobel Peace Prize recipient.

YRUU is a conference for youths run by youths (ages fifteen to twenty-two). "Mind Your Heart" is about making the connection between the logical brain and the emotional heart.






